


Mission & Vision

What a Difference a Year Makes

What a difference a year makes. The Northfield Arts Guild kicked off its 60th Anniversary year on August 20, 2019 with an ice cream social in honor of Myrna Johnson Day. It was a wonderful event, outdoors on the lawn at the theater, well attended, no masks or social distancing required. Our theater season was dubbed the 60 Carat Season, and a 40th Anniversary CVRO season was on the books as well. We were looking forward to a busy year, full of exhibitions, plays, concerts, classes and gift shop visitors. Then in March everything changed. Performances were cancelled. Meetings and classes went online. Our gallery bravely presented all their scheduled exhibitions of the season, it's just that some of them could only be viewed online. People hunkered down. We all had to make many hard decisions.

So it was all a bust right? I don't think so. The Arts Guild is finding new ways to reach our audiences. Heather is hosting virtual artist receptions for each gallery exhibition. It's not the same experience as the traditional hors d'oeuvres and wine receptions but I find them very informative and they are recorded for those who cannot participate in real time. Our instructors pivoted to online classes. We have continued arts outreach through online instruction videos and creating and distributing 850 free art kits for our art-at-home activities. We're also producing a first ever Solos monologue writing and performance festival, the brainchild of Brendon Etter. Twelve monologues have been selected and recorded, soon to be released to our audiences. Online, of course. The gift shop and the main gallery are again open to the public, currently with limited hours and limited numbers of visitors, but we have added options for shopping at home or contactless pickup. It's all there on our website under the Guild @ Home tab.

Creativity thrives on limitations, though. Circumstance forced our hand and as artists, we're expressing ourselves in new ways and in different media we never dreamed of a year ago. What artistic endeavor are you working on next? How did 2020 shape it? For over 60 years, the Guild has been supporting and facilitating All Kinds of Art for All Kinds of People in our community and we plan to continue doing just that for another 60 years. We thank you for your support over the past year and we can't wait to see what you come up with next!





Your past, present and future work for and support of the Guild continues this promise. In this spirit, the Guild's board and staff embarked on creating a new three-year strategic plan that lays a road map for all we hope to achieve in service of our mission through 2023 and beyond.

While this process was impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic and the murder of George Floyd and the riots that ensued, we were reminded that we have the power to make systemic change to increase equity, diversity and inclusion in every aspect of our organization. I am proud that our board is increasing representation of our diverse community with the recent addition of two talented professionals who are also people of color, and we continue to aim higher. We acknowledge we can and must continue to do better.

I also want to express how incredibly proud I am of the Guild's staff for developing deeply meaningful anniversary programming and applaud their immediate response to the stay-at-home orders, rallying to create new online programming and tools to better reach and serve people of all ages. While our downtown building reopened in August, we are continuing to fill our YouTube channel and Guild@Home webpage with videos of exhibition tours, artist receptions, arts instruction (offered in English and Spanish!), and dance and theater performances until we can gather again and for those who still cannot visit us.

The pandemic continues to impact us all, including the Guild. However, as challenging times have occurred throughout our 60-year history, I am heartened that we still find ways to support each other and the Guild's mission in our community. Your memberships, donations, sponsorships, gift shop purchases and participation sustain the Northfield Arts Guild and confirm that there is no quarantine for creativity or limits on what we can accomplish together.

21 exhibitions were presented in our Main Gallery, Up Gallery, and six satellite galleries serving 195 adult artists, 940 youth artists and drawing 23,638 visitors in person and online.


Exhibitions continued during our temporarily closure, offering engaging virtual receptions, exhibition tours and online publications.

GIFT SHOP

The Guild Gift Shop continues to be an important economic outlet for 115 member artists.

Performing Arts

THEATER

Our 60 Carat Season launched with the world premier LAB production of *The Great Northfield Bank Robbery:* A Love Story, followed by the classic farce, Lend Me a Tenor. We also staged CASTastrophe2 led by Pauline Jennings. Together these plays drew over 1,513 people.

While we sadly had to cancel *Grey Gardens* and *Billy Elliot the Musical*, we will be able to postpone *The Lion in Winter* to summer 2020.

The season showcased the work of 40 actors, 67 artistic crew and 57 front of house volunteers.

VIEWING CLUB

Performing Arts transitioned online with the Viewing Club, offering participants access to recordings of regional and national productions followed by indepth discussions on Zoom.

Education

PURPLE DOOR YOUTH THEATER

PDYT offers youth hands-on experience in acting and technical and administrative theater led by our staff of theater artists to produce high-quality theatrical productions.

We presented a fantastic production of *Matilda the Musical* and the PPDYT production of *The Prince and The Pauper*, cut short by March stay-at-home orders. Both productions served a cast and crew of 54 students performing to 979 attendees.

YOUNG PEOPLE'S THEATER WORKSHOP

In its 30th Year, YPTW offered instruction in creative performance for 33 youth entering grades 3-12. Two sessions were held online with an audience of 603

CLASSES

The Guild offered seasonal classes serving adults and youth of all ages in dance, theater, clay and more for artists of all ages and abilities.

Of these, most spring and all summer classes took place online when education programming transitioned to Zoom in March. Our thanks to teachers and students for staying connected to arts learning at the Guild!

INSPIRATION STATION

The Guild brings art making directly to our community with a roving art cart filled with projects to spark your imagination. In just six months, we held 12 visits serving 1,247 youth and 173 adults.

Starting in March, we transitioned by distributing over 850 free art kits to area youth. As a first, this program was offered in English and Spanish.

OPEN ART / GUILD@HOME

Open Art offers free drop-in art making sessions in our art studio. In-person visits reached 169 youth and 177 adults. Instruction was, again, bilingual.

In March, we transitioned to offering free arts instruction videos which have served 264 people.

EVENTS

Nearly 1,000 people attended Winter Walk, and we transitioned our annual spring event online, offering numerous performance and educational videos, rebranded as E-magination Celebration, serving 923 online visitors.









READ TOGETHER CREATE TOGETHER

RTCT brings arts-based literacy lessons to youth between the ages of 2-5 in area in-home day-cares. In 2019-20 we held 7 residencies supporting 32 youth. For a second year in a row, 94% of youth improved their kindergarten readiness. RTCT is a collaboration with Healthy Community Initiative.
